This month, let's take a closer look at the Jimmy Acres logo. Designed by up-and-coming cow-related graphic artist, Jake Tommerdahl, and polished by graphic editor, Anna Tommerdahl, the new logo illustrates the junction of the rustic and the modern, the union of nature and technology.

Here on the farm, we aim to facilitate as many natural processes as possible: allowing cattle to fertilize and mow the grass, encouraging plant roots to aerate the soil, and increasing our plant diversity in order to promote a healthy balance between pest and beneficial insect populations. The Jimmy Cow riding the tractor depicts these relationships. Not only do cows convert grasses into steaks or cheese or ice cream (what a

miracle!), but their grazing acts as a tool for us to manage our land. Along with other animals and used correctly, cattle impact can build fertile soils from which we can grow highly nutrient dense fruits and vegetables. The plants in turn grow a lush canopy above ground that provides protection for the soil and an abundant network of roots below that support trillions of microbes, as depicted by the grass, tomato plants and roots in our logo. Finally, the Möbius Clover as the "I" in Jimmy symbolizes how these plants and animals function as an eternal, cyclical network, while also

reflecting our use of nitrogen-fixing plants to help build and enrich our soils. Animals and plants have evolved to rely on one another. In exchange for optimizing the plant-animal symbiosis, we're just harvesting a little bit off the top.

One more thing to note that may be hard to tell from our black and white logo: the cow is wearing a ball cap. This feature pays homage to the fact that the fellows in the Tommerdahl family (excluding Lance) collectively share half a head of hair...at best. Our hats are our most important piece of clothing.

Over Christmas, we got a chance to see how the Jimmy Acres tractor cow looks on t-shirts and hats (thanks, Dad!). We thought the apparel turned out pretty snazzy.
